Schedule for in-person meetings:

This semester, many aspects of our on-campus experience will be different. While we all wish that campus could function normally, we know that this simply isn't possible right now. To make sure that we can all remain on campus together, we need to do our part to follow the Protect Purdue Pledge and Purdue's guidelines for physical distancing. With that in mind, our course will follow a schedule that will allow us to de-densify our in-person meetings and maintain physical distance when we're in class together.

The class will be divided into two groups: **Group A** will attend in-person classes on **Mondays**, and **Group B** will attend in-person classes on **Wednesdays**. All of our in-person classes will be live-streamed and recorded using Boilercast and will be available for viewing on our course Brightspace page. On the days when you are not scheduled to attend class in person, you may watch the recordings of the lectures on your own time or you may watch the live stream. If you choose to watch the live stream, you may ask questions in real time using Hotseat. **Fridays** will be **lab days**. On Fridays, we will all meet together on WebEx. You will work in small groups to complete lab activities based on what we've been learning in class. The weekly lab activities will count toward your participation grade (see *participation* below).

Course description:

This course provides an introduction to Linguistics, the scientific study of human language. The areas of linguistic analysis that will be covered include phonetics, phonology, morphology, syntax, semantics, pragmatics, historical linguistics, sociolinguistics, and first language acquisition. In addition to the core concepts and methodologies from each domain of linguistic analysis, we will also discuss topics such as the role of language in society, the nature of dialect variation, and language change.

Participation: 25%

Active participation in class is required. Each week, you will earn participation credit by attending (or watching) the in-person lectures and by completing the lab activities. Failure to watch the lectures or complete the lab activities by 11:59pm on Sunday will negatively affect your participation grade.

Homework assignments: 30%

Six homework assignments will be assigned during the semester, and each assignment is worth 5% of your final grade, for a total of 30%. Each homework assignment will be on one or two topics that we have covered in class. Homework should be submitted via the course Brightspace page by class time on the assigned due date (for due dates, see the course schedule below).

NOTE: Unless you have received instructor approval prior to the due date, late work will be penalized 15% and must be submitted by the next class period following the original due date. After that, late work will not be accepted. If there is an emergency, contact me as soon as possible to discuss how to make up the material.

Ouiz: 5%

The quiz will cover chapter 2 (phonetics) and chapter 3 (phonology). This will be a take home assignment.

Midterm Exams (2): 40%

Twice during the semester, there will be midterm exams covering specific topics. Each Midterm accounts for 20% of your final grade, for a total of 40%. No make-up midterms will be given without a valid excuse.

Preparation:

You are expected to come to class having done the required reading and/or homework. Completing the required reading and homework each week is crucial to your success in this course.

Attendance:

Regular attendance is expected. However, if you are feeling unwell, please do not come to class.
